Review all ceremony elements for inclusivity, including speeches, music, and decorations. Train staff on cultural sensitivity, and provide options to accommodate diverse guest needs, such as dietary restrictions or prayer spaces. Confetti or balloons	Slips, choking hazard	Using celebratory effects like confetti adds to the joyous mood, providing a festive conclusion to the ceremony. Medical emergencies	Health emergencies, delayed medical assistance	Being prepared for medical issues ensures attendee safety, allowing the event to proceed smoothly. Use temporary flooring or walkways where needed, and advise attendees to wear suitable footwear. Secure decorations and equipment so they don't obstruct walkways, and keep pathways well lit and clear of hazards. Station staff to monitor high-traffic areas and respond quickly to issues. Stress or anxiety among attendees	Emotional distress, panic attacks	Accommodating all emotional needs creates an inclusive event where everyone can celebrate comfortably. Technical and digital failures	System breakdowns, delayed presentations, disruption	, ,	Test all audiovisual and digital equipment before the event, keep backup equipment available, and employ staff with appropriate technical experience. Maintain hard copies of seating plans, schedules, and other essentials in case of system failure. Provide on-site technical support to resolve issues quickly and minimise disruption. Encourage sustainable transport options such as cycling, walking, or public transport, and advise those arriving on foot or by bike to wear high-visibility clothing and use lights so they remain clearly visible.
